In mid-November I visited our CrossPoint Church. Bill and Candice Shoemaker began this congregation in 1998, and over the years it's met in several locations. Currently they meet in a renovated storefront setting at 2019 Broad Avenue in Findlay, Ohio.



Jim and Angela Klausing serve as the pastoral team leading the church with the assistance of elders Julie Calvin, Pete Male, Carla Nichols, Dan Routzon, and Ed Wymer. The ministry of the church is built around three imperatives: Live passionately, Inspire hope, and Point to Christ.

Back in June, Pastor Jim invited me to come talk about CGGC ministries and preach. I accepted and did just that. As part of the ministry overview I told a story from my 2010 visit to Bangladesh which also served to introduce the message. We worshipped that Sunday morning in a mud walled, thatched roof church building with me preaching. The facility though ever so humble served not only as a sanctuary, but as a school through the week and a periodic clinic for our visiting medical staff. After the service a little old grandmother came to me and asked me something in Bengali. I couldn't understand her words, but her face showed intense longing. Our field director Uttam Dewan translated, "When are you coming to our village?"

This question provided a good start point for my message from Acts 16 where the Macedonian man begs Paul and his ministry team to "Come and Help Us!" Using that plea as my title and theme I talked with the church about three things: 1) Praying for God's vision on where to share the Gospel, 2) Going where He directs, and 3) Being sensitive to the opportunities He provides. In every community, whether in Bangladesh or America, there are many, many people who need and want the Gospel of Jesus to transform their lives and bring hope. They are simply waiting for someone to come and share the "good news" with them. I called upon the congregation to become personally involved in reaching the Findlay community and beyond for Jesus Christ. I asked them to seriously consider becoming involved in our Hear the Call endeavor to start new churches worldwide.

In some ways I was "preaching to the choir" as CrossPoint Church helped Nate and Allison Buck launch Catalyst Church in 2001 and just this year supported Eric and Kate Ferguson in planting Movement Church (both in Findlay). CrossPoint is truly an "Antioch" or sending church as Devon and Tabitha Dillinger, who serve on our Southwest mission field, and Rikkz and Andrea Premnath, who plan to go to India as missionaries, all came out of this congregation. Others in pastoral ministry today, like Brandon and Ellen Kelly, felt their call while at CrossPoint. In addition, the congregation partners with other groups in Findlay (City Mission, Child's Mentoring Connection, Open Arms, etc.), and supports CGGC missions worldwide.

Train Your Church Leaders

In the fall of 1988, my last semester of college, I filled in as the youth pastor at a local church. I was given a key to the church and wished the very best of luck. Truthfully it was a fairly frustrating few months.

I didn't know how to engage volunteers. I didn't know how to turn the youth into an effective team. I didn't know how to develop young leaders. I was young and available. Luck wasn't enough. I needed training. I wasn't the only one.
