In addition a select choir from Global Vision Christian School (our Korean students) led the congregation in "Lo, How a Rose." The music filled both the hall and the soul as well.

Walker and in honor of the Walker family. Mike secured the 1853 bell from our Harrisburg First Church when they sold their bethel earlier this year and had it transported to the Scotland Campus. It provides an appropriate link for the Churches of God mission then and now. I offered the closing blessing and we five worship leaders recessed to greet the congregation. I suggest readers plan to come next year. I certainly will!
