Wilkin Center Open House & Dedication--Vol. 9, No. 25

It was nine months in the making, but well worth the wait. Last September the Administrative Council approved the renovation of the Christian Ministry Center that houses our General Conference operations. Nothing much had been done to upgrade the building since its construction in 1981. After thirty plus years of operation, the facility definitely needed renewing. However, this project was to be more than a repainting. I organized a committee, and we began to work on recreating the interior hallways to reflect the ministry and mission of the Churches of God, General Conference (CGGC) both historically and in today's context.

It started with the walls, floors, lights, and furniture. Coordinating everything required deciding the overall theme and color schemes before anything else. This design phase took months to work out the details and in fact some were not decided until near completion. Thankfully Ron Harvey from College First Church spearheaded this aspect, taking the ideas of the committee and translating them into reality. We went through many revisions before deciding upon the final rendition. Ron's advertising business enabled us to identify vendors and tradesmen who produced the various components needed.

Dick and Barb have served the CGGC for more than sixty years in various capacities. In addition to his role as CGGC Administrator (1970-1986), Dick pastored Churches of God congregations in Ohio at Neptune (1952-1958) and Wharton (1959-1964), as well as Ft Wayne, IN (1964-1970). A 1952 graduate of Findlay College he was ordained by the Ohio Conference in 1953. Barb, a 1951 graduate of Findlay College, served for many years as the treasurer/financial controller for the Ohio Conference/Great Lakes Region. Dick has also been a trustee of The University of Findlay (since 1985), receiving an honorary doctorate in 1975, and Winebrenner Theological Seminary (1980-1987).

The purpose of the project was to provide a continuing visual proclamation of the mission of the Church and specifically the CGGC. We wanted to utilize the hall walls of the center as a kind of storyboard to hiahliaht CGGC history and current ministries worldwide. That was the vision. The Administrative Council also decided to rename the building in honor of the first CGGC Administrator/Executive Director, Dr. Richard E Wilkin and his wife Barbara. Over the many months of renovation it was a bit challenging to keep the renaming a secret from "Dick" and Barb, but I think we succeeded.

In response to renaming the building in their honor, Dick (pictured at left) commented that it represents the work of many people past and present who had a vision for a Christian ministry center and who have carried out Christ's ministry therein. It is the result of the prayers and labors of many, not of one or of a few. He gave the Lord all the praise for the Gospel work achieved in and through the building.
