WTS Leadership Luncheon: The following Tuesday, January 27, Linda and I attended a luncheon sponsored by Winebrenner Theological Seminary (WTS). They serve as a host site for Willow Creek's Global Leadership Summit held annually in August, and several times through the year they bring together local church leaders to discuss various topics. We watched a video from the 2014 Summit featuring Jeffrey Immelt, the President and CEO of General Electric who talked about "Positioning Your Organization for the Future." He stressed the importance of simplification and recommended reducing management, being externally focused, putting things on the clock, and empowering people with information and opportunity. Not bad advice for the Church, I thought.

We table talked his points for a while before a group panel of our own local "experts" addressed crucial leadership issues and responded to questions from the assembly. Jim Allen of WTS moderated. At the end Dave Draper, WTS president, pronounced the benediction and sent everyone on their way.

Here We Stand Meeting: Last September the Administrative Council appointed a writing team to be led by Mike Walker to take a fresh look at the various position statements on social and moral issues made by the CGGC over the years, some dating back to 1844. Basically the committee was charged with creating a fresh declaration to serve the Church and present to the world the CGGC's views on

various concerns from a biblical perspective. Many of the existing statements need put in their contemporary context and all of them need to be brought together into a unified whole. In addition, several new statements are needed to address the new issues that have arisen since the last document was produced thirty years ago. The committee first met in late September to chart out a course by assessing the existing documents and assigning topics to various writers. Then, three weeks ago the writers came back together to revise and refine. The next gathering will be later this spring to continue the editing process. By this fall or spring 2016 the text should be ready for broader input from across the CGGC.
