For those unfamiliar with this ministry, people fill shoeboxes with things that would delight a child (toys, crayons, school supplies, hard candy, etc.). The local church collects them and sends them to Samaritan's Purse which then distributes them all over the world. For many children these are the only gift boxes they ever receive. Having worked at the shipping center in Boone, NC the past several years, I highly recommend this ministry. It's a great way to express a thankful heart and bless a child somewhere in the world at the same time. Just for the record as far as we've been able to track CGGC congregations sent 5993 boxes last year and 4736 in 2012. We'll start posting 2014 numbers in the eNews soon and maybe we'll go beyond the 6000 mark this year. PTL!

Train Your Church Leaders

In the fall of 1988, my last semester of college, I filled in as the youth pastor at a local church. I was given a key to the church and wished the very best of luck. Truthfully it was a fairly frustrating few months.

I didn't know how to engage volunteers. I didn't know how to turn the youth into an effective team. I didn't know how to develop young leaders. I was young and available. Luck wasn't enough. I needed training. I wasn't the only one.
