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In recent years the Churches of God, General Conference (CGGC) has sponsored a fall gathering of pastors and church leaders in Findlay, Ohio for the purpose of church development and theological reflection.



Getting ready for The Gathering

This year on October 14 - 15 Scot McKnight came and presented on the basic theme of "The Gospel" - its essence (What is it?), its purpose (Why is it?), and its impact (How is it carried out?). His premise is that the contemporary Church has accepted a lesser gospel than that proclaimed in the Bible and consequently missed the fullness of the mission of God in the world and the Church's role in that mission. In this eNews I offer a synopsis of McKnight's presentation. I hope we all may gain a greater understanding of the Gospel and the Kingdom of God, one that propels us forward in and on mission.



Scot McKnight

Scot McKnight is a New Testament scholar, historian of early Christianity, theologian, speaker, and author who has written widely on the historical Jesus, early Christianity, the emerging and missional church movements, spiritual formation and Christian living. He is currently Professor of New Testament at Northern Baptist Seminary in Lombard, IL, and an ordained Anglican with Anabaptist leanings. He earned his B.A. degree from Grand Rapids Baptist College (now known as Cornerstone University), an M.A. from Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, and a Ph.D. from the University of Nottingham in 1986.

In the first session McKnight focused the conversation on defining the Gospel as given by the Apostles (Acts 2, 6, 7, 10; 1 Corinthians 15; 2 Timothy 2:8; etc.). Basically the Gospel is Jesus. He is the Christ, the son of the living God. the fulfillment of God's promised deliverer as revealed to Israel. The living Lord Jesus Christ transforms everything, from individual lives to the existing world order. The Church has sadly traded the life-changing Gospel for a transactional event, whether it's catechetical instruction and induction or a spiritual experience and "praying the sinner's prayer." Of the 90% who enter the faith via these routes as children or youths, only 20% remain in Christ at age 35. The issue is discipleship, or more specifically, introducing people to Jesus and helping them grow into deeper relationship with him. The Gospel centers in the answer to this one question: "Who do you think Jesus is?"

The second session focused on the purpose of the Gospel, or God's mission in the world. Historically the Church has defined its mission/purpose from four perspectives:

- Salvation a holistic view focusing upon individual social and/or spiritual needs
- Church an ecclesiastical approach establishing a worldwide presence through local churches
- Kingdom a tangible presence representing the rule of God in human society
- Justice & Peace social activism fomenting positive change to existing realities

Each of the above is important and come into play in God's mission, but the Church often identifies with only one aspect of the total mission. To do so is a huge mistake as a full Gospel involves all four.

McKnight developed the third dimension in more detail to illustrate the components necessary to clarify the mission of God in the Church. He named five essential elements of biblical kingdom thinking. If there is a Kingdom, there must be...

- 1. **A King** It's Jesus! He's at the center of everything, and everything is done for him.
- 2. A Rule To be king, Jesus must rule as sovereign and redeemer.
- 3. A People In the Old Testament it was Israel, but in the New it's the Church from all nations.
- 4. A Law It was the Torah, but now it's the teachings of Jesus directed by the Holy Spirit.
- 5. A Land Israel had a land, and the people of God today do also (Hebrews 11, Revelation 20-22).

In the final session McKnight talked about the impact of the Gospel for the local church. He shared 15 core ideas that came from his book, <u>Kingdom Conspiracy</u>. I will quote only the last of these, but I suggest reading the book for the rest as all were quite valuable to stimulate thinking and provide a guide for becoming a better New Testament church. Here's the quote: *The only place kingdom work is and can be done is in and through the local church when disciples (kingdom citizens, church people) are doing Kingdom Mission*. To this I can only add a hearty AMEN!
